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The Two "Whens" for Reading Aloud

The Chronological "When" -- The Reader's Ladder

- When reading aloud to your child you can choose book a full year or two above what he or she is reading independently
- At times it can be good to read books to your child at the same level or even an easier level than what he or she can read independently
 - o To affirm his or her wise reading choices
 - o To share in his or her independent reading life
 - o To bring more family members into the circle of the reading experience
- At every age there are books that can enhance a child's reading development
- No matter your child's age, reading aloud is an amazing way to help your child build vocabulary and gain an awareness of grammar
 - You are literally "marinating your kids in language"

Examples by Age:

- o Birth to Age Two: Beginning the Magical Journey
 - Black and white books for newborns -- research has shown that babies are particularly aware of defined distinctions between black and white tones
 - Baby face books -- babies love books with baby faces in them, these readings build their sense of themselves and their empathy
 - Tactile books for newborns -- babies love strong visuals, vibrant colors and books with texture and three-dimensionality
- Two to Three Years Old: Leaping Toward Understanding
 - Happy endings -- these books give reassurance to your child as he or she begins to experience worry or frustration in the world
 - Alphabet books -- these books will help you notice print with your child, they have predictable print in predictable places at predictable times
 - Label books these are essential reading at this age, as words are

pouring over, through and into your child

- o Four Years Old: Loving the Story
 - Folktales and fairy tales -- this genre has a powerful sense of story and story structure, be aware of the scary elements that some young fouryear-olds might not be ready for
 - The Rhythms of language -- these books support the four-year-old's love of songs, poems and chants, read these aloud and clap along with their rhythms
 - Funny books -- embrace the silliness of your four-year-old, these books will help you share the magnificent humor that can be found in literature
- o Five Years Old: Balancing Challenges and Comfort
 - Kindergarten books -- these books will honor the milestone of entering school, while giving your child an opportunity to express concerns and ask questions
 - Question books -- these books will help satisfy a five-year-olds desire to know the ins and outs of everything
 - Books about Making things -- at this age kids like to see how things get set up and are made, explore the process of making something together through literature
